

Election Calendar

- --Petitioning for Presidential Candidates and Convention Delegates began January 3 and will end at the end of February.
- --The primaries for Congress, state legislature and all other offices except President are likely to be permanently moved to June, which means petitioning would begin in March. The move from September is mandated because the traditional September date does not give enough time for overseas service members to receive their absentee ballots, a violation of the Help America Vote Act. This is true enough, but note that the Republicans only care about armed forces voters; they are trying to disenfranchise many others with phony claims about "voter fraud." This will be the subject of our February forum, unless we have to hold our endorsement meeting then.
- --In order to hold legislative elections this year, the legislative districts must be redrawn. Redistricting is a lengthy and contentious process (see below) and the goal of coming to agreement on Congressional, State Senate and State Assembly lines while moving the primary date up three months seems almost impossible to achieve, especially if Governor Cuomo persists in demanding that the lines be set by an "independent" redistricting commission, which does not currently exist, and would have no statutory authority even if it did.

- --One possible way of "buying" a few more weeks for the legislature to cut both the length of the petitioning period and the number of signatures required for ballot access roughly in half. This would mean petitioning wouldn't begin until sometime in April—which is still just around the corner.

Redistricting Facts and Myths

1) Independent, nonpartisan redistricting commissions are not independent, they're not nonpartisan, and they do not produce better results. Look at our City Council districts, drawn by such a commission. Our (West 96th-125th) community, which is both ethnically diverse and geographically cohesive, is chopped up among three different City

- Council districts, and receives no effective community representation from any of them. This is not to disparage the Council Members from these districts, Bob Jackson, Melissa Mark-Viverito, and Inez Dickens, all of whom I support, but their bases, their main offices, and their focuses are in West, East and Central Harlem respectively. Nationally, whenever there is an "independent", "nonpartisan" redistricting commission it is lobbied unto death by special interests of each party, the commissioners vote according to their personal political persuasions, and in the case of deadlock one or two commissioners decide the whole outcome. 2) There is nothing inherently wrong with legislators having the main voice in determining their own districts: they know them better than anyone else! Who knows and can fight better for the people of Manhattan Valley, Danny O'Donnell, who has worked with them for so long, or Common Cause, which wants to move them into the central Harlem AD, or the Puerto Rican Legal Defense fund, which wants to exile them to East Harlem? In each case, Manhattan Valley citizens who now only have to walk a few blocks to Danny O'Donnell's office would have to travel more than a mile into communities far from their normal paths. And once again, it is not the excellent representatives of these districts, Keith Wright and Robert Rodriguez, who want this idiocy; it is outsiders who have no knowledge of our community or its needs.
- 3) The solution, at least in outline form, is clear: legislators draw their lines, subject to veto from the Governor and/or some sort of independent oversight committee. Grossly partisan or gerrymandered districts would be rejected. Major communities would neither be chopped up nor annexed to geographically distant communities, especially for the smaller, more service-oriented State Assembly and City Council Districts. And recognition would be given to the fact that just because one legislatively drawn redistricting plan is bad—such as whatever the Republicans in the NY State Senate come up with every single decade all such plans are not bad, and must therefore be replaced with a system which produces districts which are usually worse.

It now looks more likely that the primary will be held in August rather than June (or September as it's always been), which would mean petitioning would probably run early May to the middle of June. This gives the political process more time to work out the thorny redistricting issues, but sets the primary at a time when many people won't be here. Stay tuned

State Committeeman

Greetings all – I had a chance to see many of you at the numerous holiday parties this season, but if I

missed you, best wishes for a happy and healthy new year.

It has been a whirlwind of a year, recapping briefly, I began my position as State Committeeman in September 2010 and it has been a fascinating, maddening, invigorating experience. I intend to seek re-election this year and hope to have your support.

When I first started the most immediate question then was whether Jay Jacobs would remain chairman of the State Party. That issue is resolved affirmatively, somewhat to our detriment though, as his behavior has not been the most inclusive or (small d) democratic.

And Cuomo's first year was mixed – good on some social issues, particularly marriage equality, and more recently on the taxicab bill. And he continues to make encouraging statements that he intends to close Indian Point. On fracking, he is coy, flirting with both sides while counseling patience while the State's environmental agency completes its work. But media reports and individual meetings with west side activists have shown, the agency is not prepared for the environmental damage likely to ensue if fracking is approved.

The Reform Caucus of the State Committee has met repeatedly over the past 16 months and we have been invigorated by the State Party's recent attempts to prevent us from passing resolutions submitted in favor of progressive taxation and against fracking. Considering that usually that the press generally ignores the resolutions of the State Committee, the recent heavy-handed actions by the aforementioned Mr. Jacobs have only fueled the issue. We have demanded, and been granted, and audience with the Great Oz next month, where we will press our case that unless the State Party allows our resolutions on the floor, and a hand-counted vote, we will sue for our rights under the State's open meeting laws.

Redistricting is lurching forward, and despite broad and deep dissatisfaction with LATFOR (the state's legislative task force on redistricting), with testimony by many westsiders, including me, the committee has drafted new lines, and early feedback is that they are awful. The governor has proposed vetoing the lines, but it remains to be seen if he will follow through with his threat.

So we enter a new year with much uncertainty, although with also some positive glimmers –

Obama was widely considered in trouble at the beginning of 2011, and he has ended in a much better position, largely as the result of the GOP imploding with multiple flavors of the month (gosh, I MISS Herman Cain). Romney is still likely to be the nominee, and as a result, likely to give the President a run for the White House. But I feel that the mood of the country is such that it would be difficult for Mitt "Mr. One Percent" Romney to get elected in 2012.

And rounding out the whirlwind of 2011, I got engaged over the summer and I am scheduled to be married in early January 2012. I may miss seeing some of you at January meetings due to a short honeymoon, but I hope to see you on the petitioning trail for Obama in 2012!
